I. Why did you decide to run for Mayor/Council?

Having eleven years experience as Councilman and Mayor I wanted to bring back my knowledge and help manage the city in these critical times of rising costs and a stagnant economy, and help lead the city toward progress while keeping the city affordable for seniors, young families, singles and other working and middle class residents.

2. What is your vision for Ferndale? Over the next four years? Over the next ten years?

I would like to continue our progress as a city emulated by others because of our success at revival and rejuvenation through inclusion and community, while trying to hold down spiraling costs within our local government that results in high taxes, high water bills, and high parking rates.

3. What two (2) things are you going to do that will bring your vision to reality?

Freeze or lower our water rates, and add transparency to those charges and costs.

I will not support raising parking rates in our downtown, and will work to cut spending on studies, analyses, and consultants so that low and middle income families can continue to call Ferndale home.

4. Of all the issues facing Ferndale, what two (2) would you give top priority and why?

The parking system is very unpopular and dysfunctional and expensive. We need to figure out the best ways to support our businesses, raise funds for parking improvements, and provide shoppers and visitors with a pleasant, and efficient way to park.

I'm also concerned that deficits loom in our future which can result in years of higher rates, fees, and taxes. I would begin now to trim costs to provide for basic services while cutting back on frills, pet projects, and over spending on consultants and other costs.

I have been answering this question for hundreds of people for the past 20 years.
